Our Purpose



Home Office purpose:

Working together to protect the public



The UK Border Agency will:

Secure our borders and control migration for the benefit of our country

Strategic Objectives: UK Border Agency

We will protect our border and our national interests by:

- Guarding routes to Britain with early action overseas
- Speeding the passage of legitimate goods and authorised people
- Detecting and stopping risks and threats to Britain at our border

We will tackle border tax fraud, smuggling and immigration crime by:

- Creating and managing anti-smuggling crime partnerships in the UK and overseas
- Transforming our enforcement capability
- Transforming collection, dissemination and use of intelligence globally and locally

We will implement fair and fast decisions by:

- Welcoming the people and trade which benefits our country
- Developing and managing international alliances to support delivery
- Helping refugees and newcomers who have earned the right to stay and make Britain their home

Changes 2007 to 2010

- Movement from a government department (IND) to a shadow agency (BIA) to a full agency (UKBA)
- Movement from national service basis (Asylum, Managed Migration and Enforcement) to a new regional structure led by Regional Directors at SCS level
- Transfer of UK Visas (FCO) into a new UKBA International Group
- Transfer of Customs Officers to join Immigration Officers in a new unified Border Force

Programme Development 2007 - 2010

- **A simplified points based system for migration (PBS)**
- **A new asylum model (NAM) based on single case ownership at regional level**
- **Biometric identity cards for foreign nationals**
- **Progressive enforcement including deportation of foreign national prisoners (FNPs)**
- **E-Borders**
- **Integrated case-working (ICW) – paperless**
- **London Olympics 2010 planning**

UKBA approach to Border Security in 2012: “Business as usual” development

OFFSHORE BORDER CONTROL

Significant activity will take place away from the UK Border, prior to the individual travelling. Activities include checks carried out to gain a biometrically enabled Visa and checks against passenger manifests which will inform intervention.

SCREENING PRE-ARRIVAL

As the individual or cargo is en route, checks are taking place. Individuals and freight can be identified and resources are deployed at the border to intercept those of interest based on risk.



AT THE UK BORDER

New systems and enhanced screening are able to more accurately identify individuals and freight of interest when they arrive at the UK border. Biometric documentation will be used to increase security and to facilitate the passage of legitimate passengers and trade.

IN THE UK

Using powers from the UK Borders Act 2007 introduced from 2008.

London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games

During the Olympic and Paralympic there will be a 60-day festival of sport and culture across the UK in 2012.

The Games

- 26 Olympic sports in 34 venue
- 20 Paralympic sports in 21 venues



The People

- 10,500 Olympic athletes and 4,200 Paralympic athletes, with 6000 coaches and officials.
- 20,000 press and media.
- Over 9 million tickets on sale.
- 3% rise in overseas visitors expect.
- Up to 180,000 spectators a day will enter the Park.

UKBA Olympics Programme – Vision Statement

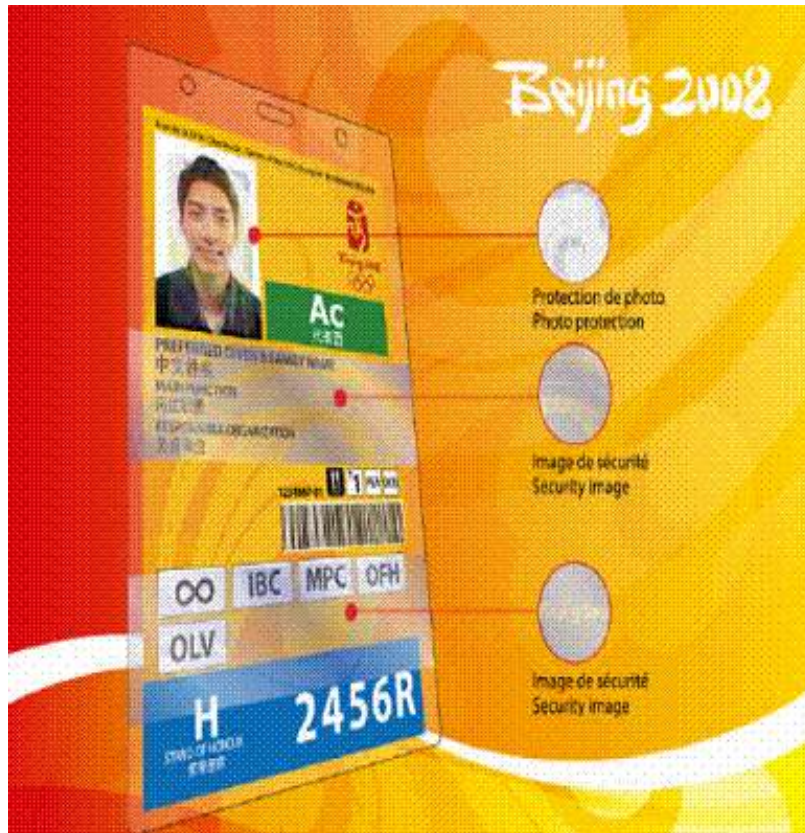
We will promote safe and secure travel to an inspirational 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games in London. Participants, workers, visitors and trade will be able to move swiftly and easily across the border, but those who would cause harm will be denied the privileges of Britain through the intelligent use of controls and state of the art technology.

Preparing the Border

- **136 special flights**
- **131 Charter flights**
- **1009 Private flights**
- **+100 heads of state to attend the opening ceremony**



Olympic Additionality



System for accrediting people to the Olympic and Paralympic Games is owned by the event organisers, the IOC and the IPC (contractor ATOS Origins).

- Card confirms identity and entitlements to athletes; team support; VIPs; and media who attend the Games in an official capacity as well as the contracted and volunteer workforce

- For foreign nationals the card will also act as a visa waiver when accompanied by a valid passport..

Protecting our Border during 2012



- Build on our business as usual activity and our planned transformation at the Border between now and 2012,
- This includes the delivery of an identity management system that will ensure non-EEA nationals have a secure identity on arrival in the UK.
- Since 2008 the UK has required visa applicants to enrol a ten finger scan and digital facial photograph as part of the application process
- Plan to track 95% of passenger journeys into and out of the UK by the end of 2010.
- Facilitate the movement of Olympic and Paralympic Family whilst maintaining the security of the UK Border.
